Message from the Patron





In tune with the vision of St. Chavara, the founder and our inspiration, Kuriakose Elias Service Society (KESS), a registered, charitable society, under 80 G, has walked tirelessly and relentlessly leaving behind a legacy of 42 years. Since its inception in 1974, by the CMI Congregation and other benefactors, KESS has come a long way in promoting and developing social welfare through committed social research and social action. With the broader aim of creating and sustaining qualitative development especially amongst the underprivileged, the organization has been making visible and tangible waves in the lives of its beneficiaries who are victims of chronic illnesses like HIV and Cancer, targets of abuse and negligence, deprived of basic essentials like food, clothing & shelter, as well as those in disaster struck regions. With its soothing branches spread all over the state and its readiness to reach any remote area in the country, KESS stands apart as an exemplary model of social work, striving to promote integrated and holistic development in the lives of all it touches.

Vision

Mission

To realize the vision, KESS undertakes intensive community mobilization, empower it through social conscientization, life skills and appropriate livelihood systems

Objectives

- 1. To perform works of charity for those in need, irrespective of race, caste, sex, community or creed.
- 2. To strengthen the institution of family through family–life education, counselling and other support systems, thereby its tendency towards disintegration is effectively arrested.
- 3. To build the competency of people (HRD) through education, awareness—generation and skill—training so that they can mobilize and manage resources for self—advancement.
- 4. To develop, in partnership with the stakeholders, adequate infrastructural facilities such as housing, drinking water, electricity, path ways, community halls etc.
- 5. To focus on health–related matters and promote personal hygiene and environmental sanitation through health education, behavioral change communication (BCC) and immunization programs.
- 6. To establish self–help groups of men and women and engage them in creative activities so that they could enrich themselves with information, know–how and resources for improving their living conditions.
- 7. To address the emerging issues in the agrarian sector such as low productivity, indebtedness, suicides, exploitation by traders etc and promote modern, eco friendly farming practices, value additions to the produce and maximize incomes through appropriate marketing strategies.
- 8. To intervene immediately in disaster–hit areas and undertake relief and rehabilitation work in a participatory manner.

KESS has a profound history of creating a prolific difference through its various projects and programmes. The core thrust of our activities lies on education, health, income generation, social security, poverty eradication, socio-economic development, legal aid, child development and women empowerment. Looking back, KESS stands overwhelmed yet humble by the impact it has been able to make through various programmes such as Thrissur Integrated Development Project 89-96, Grassroot Organization Project 90-92, Prime Minister's Rozgar Yojana (P.M.R.Y) in '93; Bhakshya Samrudhi '99; Janasree Bhima Yojana '00; Trysem; Jalanidhi projects in Thekkumkara and Madakkathara Gramapanchayaths; Earn While Learn Scheme; Madathumpadi Community Irrigation Scheme, which benefitted 250 agricultural families to develop 200 acres of agricultural land and 3 K Puram housing project for 52 families to name a few. Apart from these, KESS has coordinated vocational training programmes to unemployed youth through various schemes of NABARD. Some of the timely interventions of our organization in the other states include the Silvani Project [Madhya Pradesh] '79 -'80, for the development of 70 villages; Searmau Project [Madhya Pradesh] '89-'95, for the development of 40 villages; Pollachi Integrated Rural Development Project '85-'93, for the integrated development of the poor with emphasis to health education; and Apna Health Care Project [Maharashtra]. Disaster management and relief activities are also a prime concern of KESS. From the '93 Latur to '01 Gujarat earthquakes (where earthquake resistant houses were constructed), from '99 Orissa's Super cyclone to Tamil Nadu's tsunami (Keezhmidalam Tsunami Rehabilitation Project) till the recent Chennai flood disaster (distributing provisions of food, water, clothing), KESS has been there for them all.

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KESS has adopted a three pronged approach, where certain programmes are implemented directly, some are undertaken by independent societies formed by the beneficiaries themselves under the patronage of KESS; while some others are implemented by KESS and the follow up is entrusted to independent societies formed for the beneficiaries. Since its inception, KESS has maintained good liaison with all departments of Central and State Governments and has undertaken programmes with their help

and guidance. NABARD, Department of Industries, World Bank, Kerala State Social Welfare Board, Kerala Rural Water and Sanitation Agency (KRWSA), Grama Panchayaths etc. are some of the other notable institutions which have supported us in our endeavors.

Governance of KESS

The organization is regulated by the members of the General Body and the Board of Directors. The General Body, consisting of 102 members are from different walks of life. They meet annually to review the activities and provide support and suggestions for the betterment of the organization. The members of the Board of Directors are nominated and elected by the General Body once in three years. The Board of Directors meet four times annually and is responsible for the Articles of Association and the approval of the annual accounts. The Board consists of the President, Moderator, Secretary Cum Treasurer and six directors.

I. for HIV/AIDS Infected and Affected

For the last decade, KESS has been actively involved in the field of HIV/AIDS in the state. Areas of our intervention are spread throughout Thrissur, Palakkad and Calicut districts. We began this outreach in Thrissur in 2006, which is still being sustained and continued. The Palakad project ended in December 2015, and from January 2016, a similar project has been initiated in Calicut district.

Given below are the details regarding these HIV/AIDS intervention projects of KESS.

a) HAPPI: HIV/AIDS Palakkad Project for the Infected



Regional Categorization

The members of these societies include PLHIVs and well wishers consisting of teachers, lawyers, social workers, elected members etc. The map below shows the division of zones and the extent of beneficiaries in each zone.

Explanation: With reference to Table & Figure 1, we can observe that the most infected category of HIV belongs to the most productive age group among the identified beneficiaries in Palakkad. Among the infected, 57 % has been identified as females and 43% as males.

Result Highlights:

- 1. Sensitization programs to governing bodies resulted in:
 - a. Formation of Core Committees and LACs (Local Action Committees).
 - b. 43 PRIs have earmarked funds around Rs. 26,50,000 for education support and nutritious food kits for children infected and affected with HIV and they are being made available for the beneficiaries.
 - c. Extensive cooperation from the governing bodies especially the members of the panchayats, MPs and MLAs.
- 2. Memorandums regarding needs of PLHIVs were submitted to pressurize the government, resulting in:

a. Educational sponsorship programme for HIV infected/affected children mandatory for all gramapanchayaths.

b. A dialysis unit specifically for PLHIVs was made available to improve the treatment facilities for PLHIVs in the Ottapalam Taluk Hospital.

c. 55 panchayats have implemented HIV specific projects.

d. 38 panchayats have taken up sustainable options in implementing HIV specific projects.

- 3. Palakkad is declared the 1st 100% HIV literate district of India.
- 4. The Chief Minister of Kerala, Mr. Oomen Chandy participated in the 'Jyothirgamaya' campaign.
- 5. 73% of PLHIV's social inclusion has been made possible.
- 6. 20 full time and 450 part time volunteers were developed.
- 7. A large number of sponsors such as Lions Club, Congregations, Schools and Colleges came forward to support PLHIVS.
- 8. A short film -'Naira' was developed for this project.
- 9. More children of PLHIV/PAHIV were motivated to pursue higher professional education.

<u>HAPPI's happy stories</u>: <u>Motivatated to face life</u>

<u>Case 1:</u> Seema (name changed) was happily married off to an interstate driver. Initially all seemed well with a consistent flow of income and a happy family. Once the husband was diagnosed with TB and stopped work, everything changed for the worse. There was no money for treatment nor for children's education. Furthermore, they were both tested positive for HIV, which shook the husband so much, he left home and never returned.

Seema fell into absolute despair especially having no support from her in-laws or her own family. HAPPI learned about her situation and motivated her to stand up and support herself and her children. Seema found courage to face life and stand on her own feet. HAPPI helped to find her a good job and get access to medical support.

Today, she earns a consistent income and meets all the needs of her family including quality education for her children. "I would have given up my life if it were not for HAPPI", says a happy Seema.

Volunteers came forward from the religious, medical, social and like minded forums to work hand in hand with HAPPI. This is also a reflection of the support that the project received from all walks of life in the district, especially in mobilizing and sharing resources.

HAPPI's happy stories: Developing Women Leaders

Case 2: Molly was a bedridden cancer infected woman who was neglected and in depression. The HAPPI team came to know about her condition and situation and gave one to one sessions to motivate and restore her decreasing mental health more than her physical illness. This repeated care, and concern and motivation greatly inspired her. Her strengthened mind also strengthened her troubled physique. She was determined to be active and mobile again. With the assistance of the HAPPI team, she started to take continuous treatment and began to move on her own and do her daily chores by herself.

Today, Molly is an active volunteer and is also the president of one of the Societies formed for the welfare of PLHIV. She takes care of people like her as well as <u>her family</u> members including her bedridden Father-in-law.

INCOME GENERATION PROGRAMMES (IGP)

Promoting economic sustainability was one of the most challenging goals to which Income Generation Programmes were the answer. These programmes not only brought economic stability to the families but also empowered them and contributed significantly to their overall wellbeing. The project could support 118 individuals for IGPs. Considering all the activities implemented by the project, the impact of IGP stands exceptional with significant changes in the lives of PLHIV.

118 families are supported with IGP through 28 major trade options such as goat rearing, tailoring, agriculture, cloth trade, lottery trade, cattle rearing, and other small scale businesses. More than 70% of the IGP holders are regular, less than 40% are defaulters and less than 70% are irregular in repayment. 18 IGP holders have completely repaid their loans and 3 IGP holders' loans have been written off due to their death or ill health. Majority of the IGP holders (29%) undertake goat rearing as an income generation activity followed by small scale industries (25%) and tailoring units (17%). At present, the total beneficiaries provided with IGP are divided into 5 regional groups and they are brought together once in 3 months to evaluate their progress in IGP and clarify

their doubts. Training needs identified are addressed using experts in their respective IGPs.

IGP Managing Committee is a structure developed to ensure the sustainability of IGP even after the project withdrawal. The major role of this committee is to discuss & take decisions about application, selection, implementation, monitoring, repayments, distribution of revolving funds, training, consultation and development and all other activities related to IGP. The IGP holders have been educated to properly develop and manage their IGP in a systematic and professional manner. Through efficient monitoring, frequent trainings and development programmes for the IGP holders, they have become empowered to manage their work and income in a progressive manner. The success of these individual IGPs have resulted in the consideration for implementing group IGPs in the future. The foreign funding agency of this project were quite impressed with the IGP model implemented here that they have taken it up as a model IGP.



came the notion of 'Jyothirgamaya'- An HIV literacy campaign conducted by HAPPI in the entire Palakkad District. The main aim was to educate people about the perils of the disease, in reducing stigma and discrimination, protecting and bringing the affected to the mainstream of life and rehabilitating them. 1471 awareness programmes were organized for Schools, religious forums, kudumbashrees and PTA members.

awareness programmes, the result of which Palakkad became the first district in India to achieve a record of 100% HIV literacy. claim this status. The entirety Palakkad District, i.e. 91 gramapanch a y a t h s a n d 4 were involved in this programme.

This programme became a great milestone in the history of HIV

The district level valedictory function of Jyothirgamaya and thedeclaration of Mankkara as Ist gramapanchayat in the country to be 100% HIV literate, was organized on 24th September 2015 with eminent dignitaries such as the Hon.Chief Minister of Kerala, Mr. Oomen Chandy; Hon.Chairman, Palakkad Municipality, Mr.



Social capital generation was an aim of Jyothirgamaya where social values, customs and traditions were reinstated into the otherwise self-centered psyche of the non affected people. Jyothirgamaya (literally meaning 'Enlightenment') was initiated as a social inclusion strategy of the HIV awareness campaign. Many a time, the infected /affected, though not because of any reason of theirs, are not accepted or included in a social venue. The major reason being the fear of the unknown that drives people to treat them as aliens and distance themselves. This 'illiterate' practice needed to be wiped out. Hence

d) HAT - HIV/AIDS Thrissur

In continuation to the HAT project, 5 societies were formed namely Asha Society in Kodakara; Karuna Society in Wadakkanchery; SWAS Society in Thrissur; Sakti Society in Chavakad and Saphalya Society in Irinjalakuda. Initiated by KESS, these independently run societies are intended for the welfare of the HIV infected/affected people in Thrissur. The officials of these 5 societies get together on a regular basis to discuss, review, find gaps and formulate suggestions to fill the gaps in the services offered by these societies.

Each society gives different services to the infected/affected such as educational support, marriage support and nutritional kits distribution. KESS has always supported such initiatives and promotes such services undertaken by the societies.

II. For Cancer Afflicted

Chavara Cancer Care for Children Project (4C)

Cancer is one of the major lifestyle diseases which is on the rise. All members of a cancer stricken family endure the trauma related to the condition especially children whose requirements such as education, marriage and career go unnoticed and into the unknown. The 4C Project aims to provide support to such children who are afflicted by Cancer. It also includes availing schemes for cancer patients.

This project is a people's participatory one. Mobilization of resources especially financial assistance has been availed from many well wishers. Like minded organizations have come forward to network with this project. Income Generation Programmes

Cancer infected families are in dire need of economic assistance which can be attained through a sustained income source. The project was able to successfully provide income generation means to people in need.



III. KESS Initatives for Safe Drinking Water

a) JALANIDHI

The World Bank-assisted 'Kerala Rural Water Supply and Sanitation Project' better known as 'Jalanidhi', was developed by the State government as an autonomous institution for sustained delivery of adequate quantity of water and sanitation services in rural areas of Kerala. This project, designed on the redefined premise of delivery of water and sanitation services, is a demand driven project - conceptualized, planned and implemented by the users themselves as against the usual top-down approach. This is a people - owned, operated and maintained project set on a total cost- recovery basis. Adequacy of water and quality of water are equally important and are designed into components within the project design.



Among the selected four districts in the state, the project has been successfully implemented in various panchayaths of Thrissur with KESS as the supportive organization such as Thekkumkara and Madakathara gramapanchayaths earlier. Presently, KESS is in the final stage of this project in the Nadathara Gramapanchayath, which began in 2012.

The activities undertaken by KESS during the past financial year includes extensive house visits through which data

collection, verification and updating of records for documentation were made possible. Interventions include providing underground pipe connection facilities to the beneficiaries, facilitating repair and restoration of damaged pipes, provision of water and maintenance of the water source.





Table 5: Total beneficiaries and its percentage to the total population in the target area

The hesitancy of the common good even if they themselves can benefit out of it, is one of the reasons that the beneficiaries seem to be less than half the households present in the panchayat.



b) Drinking water for Chennai flood victims

The flood affected people in Chennai were sent drinking water as relief. This outreach programme of KESS was a life saver to the disaster struck residents who could not acquire basic life requirements. About 400 cases of water enough to quench 50,000 people were sent as part of our relief activities.

c)Awareness generation programmes on safe drinking water

KESS has conducted awareness generation sessions in educational institutions keeping in mind global warming, scarcity of water resources and decreasing sources of safe drinking water. Sustainable solutions for the conservation of man's primary essentials through various techniques were highlighted.



IV. for Women Empowerment

a) Self Help Groups (SHGs)

KESS has a number of SHGs which have benefitted many families to rise up from a lower economic strata mainly due to the availability of loans for different income generative start ups. The women members have developed self esteem by taking up roles of entrepreneur, skilled labourer, and others

SHG sweet story: 15 years ago, Saphiya was only a housewife in a impoverished family. One of her friends introduced KESS and the SHG concept to her. 20 women including Saphiya, jointly formed an SHG. As an SHG supported by KESS, they took a bank loan from SIB and started new enterprises like garment sale, rice powder production, bakery items trade etc. Today Saphiya and her group members earn a consistent income as entrepreneurs and meet the needs of their families.

Income Generation Programmes

Many women who were once struggling to meet everyday needs are now capable of investing in their children's education and bringing about substantial changes to their livelihood, through the Income Generation Programmes of the SHGs. Some of the flourishing IGPs are catering, textile

business, snack distribution, candle making, readymade textile shop, tailoring, rice business, umbrella manufacturing, soap manufacturing, coconut sales, meat sales, roll gold business, perfumes trading, poultry rearing, goat rearing, detergent powder manufacturing, cattle rearing, bread production, saloon, tea stall and nursery farming.

b) KESS as a Service Providing Centre (SPC)

The number of atrocities against women and conflicting families are on the rise. KESS has actively intervened as a Service Providing Centre, initiated by the Social Welfare Board, for the protection for women against domestic violence. Awareness

classes and legal intervention as an SPC has enabled KESS to reduce the intensity of ill treatment towards women. KESS has also conducted a get-together, this year, consisting of SPCs and counselling centres to discuss the roles and responsibilities undertaken as service centres for women.

c)Vadhumitra

This project initiated by KESS aims at the upliftment and holistic empowerment of today's girls, tomorrow's women. As the name implies, Vadhumitra, intends to be a friendly guide and support to girls, who would one day be the pillar and support of her own family.

Phase one of this project intends to provide support and assistance to the workers in the Devamatha Province and to their daughters who are 16 years of age or above. One form of support is financial, where a monthly deposit is made by them and 50% of the amount is deposited by the project. The total amount can be utilized when marriage is fixed or at the end of the project, whichever comes first.

The project also facilitates various empowerment programs such as monthly get-togethers, family welfare programmes, educational and entertainment sessions, counselling, all through which the girl is empowered and rises up to become a mature and wise 'kudumbini'. A healthy family environment is possible only if a woman is properly educated and empowered, thus creating better families and a better





d) Women's Day observation

KESS observed International Women's Day on March 8th. The programme was inaugurated by Ms. S. Mini, District Women Welfare Officer. Devamatha Career Expo

A career guidance expo was conducted by KESS, for the children of the employees of Devamatha Province, who study in classes 10 and 12. 21 stalls of different organizations related to law and order, education, medical, engineering, social work, media etc were made available to the students and their guardians. After a general orientation, the beneficiaries were given an opportunity to interact with the staff in each stall and get an orientation about prospective courses and job opportunities that they can consider after school. It gave them a perspective about planning for their future and to make right choices regarding their capabilities.

PSC Coaching

Students were given coaching and training about attending Public Service Commission examinations. Guidance books were also distributed for this purpose. Students need to be prepared for such competitive exams which expose them to government job opportunities. They were also given motivation and mental preparation for the same.

Girls Only, Boys Only

High school aged girls and boys (each group separately) underwent a one day residential camp at Azhikode. Apart from the experience of a group feeling and independency in self care, they were given an opportunity to be proactive in discussions, under a trainer, and initiate solutions based on them.

b) Chavara Child Resource Centre (CCRC)

The Chavara Child Resource Centre is associated with the CMI ashram under Fr. Thomson Arackal CMI at Kormala in Kodassery Panchayat. Mostly belonging to the tribal sector, the residents are poor and backward. The children are the vulnerable sector in this area lacking proper resources and motivation to develop as empowered citizens. With the aim of providing basic facilities and resources for child empowerment and hence empowering families, this centre has come into being.

c) Chavara School Social Work Programme, Pangarappilly

d)Kess Crèches

Under the Rajiv Gandhi National Creche Scheme for Children of Working mothers (Social Welfare Board) initiated in 2006, 6 creches function in Thrissur under the leadership of KESS. 30-40 children within the age group of 2 to 5 attend these crèches. The staff consisting of a teacher and a helper, develop and coordinate various programmes to educate and promote proper growth and development of each child enrolled. Picture charts, toys, play, visual techniques are all used to incorporate values and life lessons along with age specific educational classes.

The creches celebrate 'Vidyarambam'-to start the academic year on a good note, festivals like Christmas and Onam, national days like Independence Day and Children's Day as well as annual days through which children learn valuable lessons of socializing and selfless cues like sharing and caring. 

e)Yuvamitra

This Project launched on Children's Day is aimed at creating better educational prospects and thereby, a better future for students. One of the programs of this project is to ensure financial security as far as education is concerned. Students are welcome to place their share of money in this scheme and Kess will add 50 % to their investment.

The students develop a mentality to ensure savings and share in the educational expenditure burden of their families. 193 students have enrolled so far. The student category ranges from those in the Kindergarten to the Postgraduates. Yuvamitra aims to kindle the ambitious flames of budding stars of the future-enriching and empowering them on a



f) Child Protection Policy

KESS has framed a child protection policy which is applicable to all its projects with strict procedures to ensure child rights in all areas of implementation of projects. This policy is a societal commitment of KESS for the safety and protection of children, reflecting itself as a child safe organization. Behaviour protocols and code of conduct have been developed keeping the best interests of children.

Appropriate behaviour of staff towards children and vice versa, as well as appropriate behaviour of visitors and donors to children are specified and outlined to ensure an environment where children feel safe, can listen and be listened to. Staff at KESS are given orientation on child rights and child protection policy as a part of induction, and periodical trainings ensure review, discussion and betterment of the policy and its implementation in all fields of activities by the organization.



VI. for Care and Support of the Elderly

a) Karunya Project

KESS has initiated a Karunya Project for the elderly this year, keeping in mind the call from the Pope's 'Year of Mercy'. With monthly get-togethers and nutritious food kit distribution among the needy elderly, this programme intends to liven up those embittered with old age and financial burden.

More than in kind, KESS also helps make them feel special through interactive games and sessions. Around 40- 50 participants take part in these get-togethers. Special occasions like birthdays and anniversaries are celebrated and mid day meal is also provided. House visits are also conducted periodically to assess their health, living conditions and requirements, which are provided at the doorsteps as needed.



b) Distribution of mobility aids to the elderly



Wheelchairs, forearm crutches, walkers, walker canes and mobile commodes were distributed to the economically backward citizens weakened with age, residing in elder care centers and in their own homes



VII. KESS Initiatives for the disabled

Distribution of resources

To improve the functional capabilities of the disabled, rehabilitation equipment such as wheelchairs for the differently abled, airbeds, crutches, pump mattresses, water beds, special walkers, supportive tables, special pediatric wheelchairs and the like were distributed to the deserving children and adults residing in various centers functioning for the disabled.





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VIII.

for Food Security



We live in an era where unadulterated food is rare. This in turn is the prime reason for lifestyle diseases like Cancer. Even fresh food reaches our tables, poisoned and polluted. Realizing food security as the need of the hour, KESS promotes an organic culture to ensure healthy and fresh food.

a) KESS Farm

KESS farm has been in the forefront of the green initiatives of KESS. We take pride in stating that all cultivation is strictly organic and no chemical fertilizers are used. Some of the activities undertaken in

the farm include vermi compost units, ponds utilized for pisciculture, cultivation of plantains, tapioca, coconut, nutmeg etc. Fruit yielding trees like mango and jackfruit, vegetables such as cauliflower, cabbage, lady's finger, chilly, drumstick, bittergourd, snakegourd etc. The farm also develops organic and biowaste induced manure and livestock development. A team of proficient farmers strive to ensure the farm functions well.



b) KESS Nursery

KESS Nursery is an eco friendly venture to promote availability of organic saplings of fruits,

vegetables and decorative flowers. Using modern day techniques and polyhouses to cultivate and sustain tropical plants like Pulasan, Orchid, Baraba, Pista, Kiwi and the like, the KESS nursery is a venture promoting professionalism in the field.

c) Organic Kitchen Garden Promotion Programme

KESS distributed garden grow bags, organic seeds, manure and saplings to the employees of the Devamatha Province and encouraged them to develop kitchen garden competitively. Around 100 people took part in this venture whole heartedly and those who

yielded best results were rewarded with exotic saplings.

d) Trainings on organic cultivation

To promote organic healthy food culture, KESS has conducted trainings in this subject at various arenas to different groups of people. With the support from resourceful professionals such as agricultural officers and organizations like the agricultural university and krishi bhavans, these trainings and sessions have been executed well.

e) KESS Marketing Centre

A market intended to sell organically grown fruits and vegetables, directly from the produce of self help groups and organic farmers is actively thriving at KESS Bhavan premises.

XI. KESS Initiatives for Safe Shelter


Chavara Housing Project

Project summary

Target group	89 families
Project goal	Strengthen and sustain residential requirements of the deserving

Safe shelter is a basic necessity of man. It is also one of those factors that people overlook especially when everyday struggles and requirements take greater priority. In the cases of those afflicted by HIV or cancer, the efforts to make both ends meet itself are even bigger. The vicious circle of poverty often makes people neglect the conditions of their shelter and generation after generation get caught up in this flow of somehow earning just enough for the daily bread and forgets other aspects. A well built house thus becomes more of a dream rather than a basic need, because they cannot work on accomplishing it without an external hand. Our project extends this external aid to restore, maintain and construct houses of those in need. Bhoomidaan or land donation has also been provided for those having no area to call their own, along with providing housing support.

The target group are people who have the capacity to contribute to the project activities. More often than not, they do not know whom to approach and how to avail services that can help them achieve their dreams. The Chavara Housing project coordinates with Government loans and schemes, contributions and collaborations of like- minded organizations and well wishers along with the beneficiaries' participation to make their dreams come true.



XII. for Management Resource

a) URJAKIRAN- Conserving Energy Resources

Energy Conservation is the need of the hour especially due to depleting natural resources and global warming. KESS collaborated with The Energy Management Centre (EMC) & Centre for Environment & Development (CED), to sensitize the public on Urjakiran - a programme on conservation of energy resources. The major aim was to raise the awareness of the public about the critical issues of mismanagement of energy sources. Awareness classes and street plays were conducted at different venues such as schools and public bus stands. The classes were held with the cooperation of the local government authorities and the sessions were led by the resource people of EMC. The classes emphasized ways to conserve and utilize energy sources, reduce the mismanagement of electronic equipment, and even points to reduce one's electricity bill.





b) Taste for Waste-Recycling Resources for Rehabilitation

What was used and discarded is collected, recycled and reconditioned as part of this programme. The income derived from the value of these items is utilized for the rehabilitation of cancer patients and mobilized for constructing houses for the deserving poor. Items like electronic waste such as discarded computer systems and mobile phones, consumer goods such as Televisions, fridges and other gadgets; furniture such as tables, chairs, doors, windows, frames; daily used items like newspaper, books, magazines are all collected and sorted for this purpose.





Dignitary Visits

Many dignitaries from the religious, political and social work arenas have visited the various offices and fields of work of our organization. Such meetings and interactions have helped KESS immensely.



Internship Platform:

57 students from the Social Work and Legal fields of study conducted field work and internships

from 12 Colleges in the state, at KESS.
